

Fall Transition Crappies on LOZ

The dog days of summer are coming to an end and the transition to cool crisp fall weather is a much welcome time. Much is the same with the crappie on the Lake of the Ozarks. The summer's warm 86 degree bath water puts the crappie into a lethargic funk. They have become scattered and tend to hang out in their deep water haunts. These spots are usually the main channel points, deep water docks, steep bluffs and deep brush piles.

As the days get shorter and the water gets cooler the crappie's biological clock tells them to start feeding so they can fatten up so they can endure a cold winter. The crappies favorite food this time of year is the young shad that have hatched in the summer. If you can find the schools of baitfish the crappie should be nearby. They should be moving up the creeks and moving to the backs of coves.

The first thing I do is gather intelligence from local experts. You should check out Bassing Bobs fishing reports or stop in and support the local fishing stores. Rob and Ben at Fitz's Fishing can put you on the right baits and hot locations. Also, check

the weather and the wind direction before you hit the water.

Next is to locate the Shad, being the favorite meal of crappies, are weak swimmers and the wind will push them around. Check out the windward sides of coves and channels to see if they are stacked up. If so, the crappie may be close. If the water is clear the fish may be deeper or under cover. Their eyes are on the tops of their head and make them light sensitive. Use your electronics to look under docks or on deep brush piles.

Once you find them, a cork and minnow are a deadly tactic. Pitching jigs and dock shooting can also fill a live well. Depending on water clarity, colors make a big difference so choose wisely. In clear water, I prefer blue ice and monkey milk. If the water is stained, try chartreuse or pinks. Crappie nibbles may help on a jig. You can also use a fish attractant like Capt Dave's Hawg Jam smeared on a jig which will coax a skittish fish into biting.

One other technique to stack up the crappie is long line trolling. A simple spinning rod pulling a Bandit 200 or 300 let

out 50' at a speed of 1.5 mph will work fine. Finding the baitfish and troll through the clouds of shad can bring success. My favorite bandit colors are Citrus Shad, Blue Chrome, Mad Cow and Hotty Totty. Try smaller crank baits like a #5 flicker shads also because they are feeding on smaller

Fall is a great time to get out. The temperature is getting cooler and so are the water temps. Be safe and let someone know where you are going. And most importantly wear a life jacket. A fun day out can go south awful fast with a slip overboard.



Captain Dave's "HAWG JAM" Fish Attractant

Fish can see, hear, feel vibration, smell and taste. They use all these senses to hunt prey on a daily basis.

The evolution of Hawg Jam started 40 years ago while perch fishing on Lake Erie. I was intrigued with attractants to increase my catch on any given day on the water. This included the use of various extracts. squeezing minnows to exude fish scent and even spraying bait with WD 40 to put off an oily sheen in the water. They all work to a varying degree.

Since retiring as a mechanical engineer I have decided to elevate my love of fishing to the next level. What is the ultimate fish attractant for bass, crappie and all other game fish? By working with my son, a degreed bio-chemist, we have developed an all natural garlic infused "grease" we call "Hawg Jam". It appeals to a fish's sense of smell and taste. It can be applied to crank baits, hard baits, spinner baits as well as all soft plastics.

Hawg Jam has been field tested by guides, tournament anglers and avid fisherman. It has been tested on bass, crappie,

walleye, catfish, perch and salmon with amazing results. The grease lasts longer on baits and exudes a fish oil garlic infused trail in the water. Fish attack the bait and hold on longer. We have developed two versions. One a greasy waxy version for soft plastics including jigs, worms, and

swim baits and the second version in a chapstick style dispenser for crank baits, spinnerbaits, spoons and hardbaits.

2022 Bass Pro Tour Schedule Visits Lake Ozarks

Stage Four – Lake of the Ozarks, Osage Beach, Missouri (April 30- May 5)

MLF history runs deep at this 54,000-acre impoundment of the Osage River in the northern Ozarks: Takahiro Omori won the 2020 Summit Cup at Lake of the Ozarks, and it has hosted multiple Toyota Series and Bass Fishing League tournaments in late spring (many of which have required 23 to 25-pound bags to win).

"Lake of the Ozarks is a well-known lake, but as many times as the major tours have been to the Ozark (Mountains), we've never gone to the one with the biggest fish: Lake of the Ozarks," Bertrand said. "That's going to be a really interesting tournament, it's a great fishery."

PARTICIPATION OVER TIME

By every measure, freshwater fishing remained the most popular type of fishing. Freshwater gained a whopping 3.4 million participants and reached its highest number of participants since 2007. Prior to COVID-19, freshwater participation was fairly steady, and the 2020 participation rate of 14% was the highest in over a decade.



Freshwater participants were slightly less active than total participants. Just 5% reported participating 52 or more times last year versus 7% of overall anglers. The fastest growing group is the least active, as those freshwater fishing only 1-3 times per year grew 1.3% annually over the last three years.



PERCEIVED LEVEL OF FISHING PARTICIPATION


Most freshwater participants described their fishing activity as "occasional." The percentage of those who said they'd like to fish more was the same as those who said they fished as often as they like—48%.

8% total freshwater fishing participants were new participants, the highest proportion on record. The number of first time freshwater anglers grew a whopping 28% in 2020, infusing the sport with energy and opportunity amid COVID-19. Among the 2.9 million new anglers, 1.6 million were males and 1.3 million were females.

EXPECTATIONS FOR A FIRST FISHING TRIP

Amid the stress and strain of 2020, the highest percentage of first time participants, 61%, expected that their first fishing trip would be an opportunity to relax and unwind. About the same percentage wanted to spend time with family and friends, spend time outdoors and try something new.

The top three perceptions of fishing prior to a fishing trip were unchanged in 2020 from the year prior. Unfortunately all the negative perceptions—that fishing is too time consuming, uninteresting, requires too much equipment or "is not for someone like me"—were all more prevalent answers than in the year prior.


Fishing Stereotypes

STEREOTYPES OF FISHING PARTICIPANTS

Most fishing participants did not have a stereotype of anglers. Of those that did, "outdoorsy" was the most common, followed by "sportsman." Women were more likely than men to report no stereotype, while men were more likely to associate "families with kids" and "quiet" with fishing. Only a small number—6% of males and 11% of females—said that fishing is "not typically for someone like me."



Lynch Hollow

his Issue's Featured Cove is Lynch Hollow, but many refer to the cove as "Deer Valley". Located on the 10 Mile Marker, this cove features both shallow and deep water that makes for good fishing year round.


Spring

Spinnerbaits and suspending jerkbaits are excellent choices for catching big fish in the springtime on this part of the lake. In early spring, try jerkbaits on the secondary points leading in to the many pockets of this cove. Later in the spring, look for shallow cover in pea gravel pockets that have access to deep water nearby.




Summer


This cove features two main lake points at the mouth, and also a large secodary "splitter" point that are all great places to catch fish as the water warms. Typical summer patterns, like 10" worms and deep diving crankbaits excel here in the summertime.



Fall


Fall is one of the best times to fish this cove. Since the cove features both shallow and deep water, jigs and flipping style plastics are going to be the go-to baits. Target shallow docks in the backs of the pockets for bigger fish, and deeper docks towards the mouth of the cove for numbers.





Winter

During the winter months, you can target bass grouped up along the deepest holes of the channel banks towards the back of the cove, and also on one of the many secondary points. Finesse jigs, Wiggle Wart crankbaits, and jerkbaits are going to work best on these banks.







RULE #1 of Clay's

0-Rules of Successful Bass Fishing"

am getting nervous just writing this, my very first article for Bassing Bob. No not because it's my first article but because it brings back memories. I may be sitting peacefully in my chair as I write this... but...just thinking about what happened a few years ago makes me shake and break out in a cold sweat. I was filming a video for posting on the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks website.

I was fishing with Jim H. a guy who I fished with before but had to buy his lunch to "bribe" him to fish with me again. But that's a story for another day. Jim did something that made me almost pass out from anxiety. Even today as I write this I need a beverage to help settle my nerves!

He broke Rule #1 of Clay's "10-Rules of Successful Bass Fishing"...

Clay's Rule #1: "Never Leave Fish to Find Fish...EVER..."!

I guarantee that you will catch a LOT more fish if you would adopt this Rule. Except in extreme circumstances... game fish of the same species congregate together because the environmental needs of a particular fish is the same for other fish of that same species. They "school" because "mother nature" forces them too. Whatever draws a bass (or walleye, catfish, crappie, etc.) to a particular location will naturally draw other fish of the same species to that same location as well. What draws fish to a particular location is ALWAYS food and cover...except during spawning. So when the available food and cover draws one fish to that location then there is a good chance there are more fish in the same area.

Important: When you catch a bass you should ALWAYS assume others are in the area. Most of us simply continue moving our boat down the bank without regard to the "schooling" nature of fish. When you catch a bass you should spend time trying to catch others in that immediate area. That might mean using the same lure (at the same depth and speed used to catch the first fish) or it might mean changing lures, colors, presentations, etc. to trigger the other fish.

A LOT of tournaments have been won by fishing the same 100-300 yard stretch of bank...over and over and over...back and forth...changing lures, changing presentations, changing retrieves, etc.

Pro Matt Arey won the Forrest Wood Cup as a co-angler and has finished 9th in the Angler of the Year (AOY). Arey said he learned the difference between being an average tour pro and a good one isn't simply a matter of locating fish. It's also about understanding what you've found and how to manage it.

"You've really got to maximize your fish once you've found them. I used to be way too content to just catch a fish here and there off a shaky head. But I've learned that if you have identified a productive area you really have to try seven or eight different presentations and milk it for all its worth." Matt Arey-Professional **Fisherman**

Okay...so here I am filming a fishing video and...you guessed it...we found bass...a lot of bass!

Then it happened.

We were fishing in his boat and he wanted me to see the entire lake so, like a good tour guide, he continued down the bank until eventually we were on the opposite side of the lake of the fish.

NO...I'm SERIOUS...! We went to the opposite side of the lake! Really!

At first it started slowly...just a little "dry mouth". Then came the sweating followed closely by the shakes. By the time we were on the other side of the lake I was almost hyperventilating. So bad did this affect me when I got home I was soon forced to return to seeing my therapist. Me...the "Hemmingway of Fishing Articles" having to see my therapist...again!

Want to catch more fish (and avoid seeing your therapist)? Adopt Rule #1 of Clay's "10 Rules of Successful Bass Fishing"..."Never Leave Fish to Find Fish...Ever"!

Until next time...take a kid fishing... or take me...my wife says it's the same thing...!



Heading Up Tributaries for Early Bass

erry Blankenship likes to run up a creek without a paddle to catch early spring bass.

Actually the Missouri angler runs up the tributaries of Ozark highland reservoirs with his outboard engine until the water gets too skinny. Then he moves farther up the creek or river with his trolling motor to reach early spring bass.

"In early spring there is always a migration of fish that go up the rivers," Blankenship says. He believes bass in the tributaries migrate down into the lake in late fall and early winter to find warmer and more stable conditions in deeper water. Then when warm spells and longer daylight hours occur in early spring, bass leave the deeper water and migrate to the riverine sections of the upper lake.

Rain runoff will also cause bass to move into the rivers, but Blankenship avoids targeting tributary bass then because the fish are on the move which makes them harder to pinpoint. The river could also be high and muddy, especially after heavy rains. "If it is a big rain it really gets the creeks up running big," Blankenship says. "Then your odds have gone down a lot because that limits you to only a few spots to fish."

Warmer water flowing into the lake from the tributaries also triggers bass into migrating up the rivers and creeks. "Once the river water gets to be warmer than the lake water that is just a trigger," Blankenship says.

That's the time to follow the bass up the creek or river "as far as your boat will let you," according to Blankenship. The depth of bass in the tributaries varies. "Some of the rivers just don't have a lot of depth," Blankenship says. "A lot of the rivers have

filled in with gravel and have lost some of the main holes. But there is always current that causes some kind of an area to get dug out. Any time you can find a place that has a little sheltered area where there is a turn in the river or a log it kind of gives those fish a chance to ambush whatever bait comes through there or just kind of rest up there.

"Any time you can find some type of small eddy that has some kind of current break in it the fish will really pile up in those places," Blankenship says. "You can then catch a lot of fish in one spot which is what really makes the river fishing fun early in the year."

The regional tournament angler begins searching for tributary bass in the deeper holes first. The tributaries also feature vast mud flats strewn with partially or wholly submerged logs and steep rock banks, both of which hold bass.

Sunshine determines if bass are more active on the flats or the steeper rock banks. "There will be days whenever the sun has been beating on the rocks and the fish will be right up on the shoreline where as soon as your bait hits the water you will catch them right tight to the bank," Blankenship says.

"It is always nice to have a good sunny day," Blankenship says. The water in the tributaries usually has some stain to it so the dirtier water absorbs the warmth of the sunshine and the warmer water tends to activate the bass then.

The water temperature in the tributaries usually dictates which lures Blankenship prefers throwing for early spring bass. During the earliest stages of the bass migration into the tributaries, Blankenship tries slow-moving lures such as suspending jerkbaits, jigs or a Texas-rigged Gene Larew Lures Hoo Daddy creature bait. If the weather has been sunny and warm for a few days, he suggests trying faster moving lures such as Storm Lures Wiggle Wart crankbaits or spinnerbaits.

Fishing up the tributaries in the early spring

can produce a mixed bag of smallmouth, largemouth and spotted bass. Blankenship frequently catches numbers of bass in the tributaries and some quality fish in the 4- to 5-pound range.



The tournament competitor notes the tributary pattern can last for two to three weeks until the fishing pressure starts slowing down the bite or the bass migrate farther up river than his bass boat can travel. He suggests anglers with jet-driven boats can run farther up the river to continue catching those fish throughout the spring and summer.

The tributaries contain plenty of navigation hazards such as logs wedged in the mud bottom of the channel and the shallow mud flats, so Blankenship advises to use extreme caution when running up the creeks and rivers. "I just recommend you take your time any time you are in unfamiliar water that you think has a lot of shallow logs and debris and rocks that can tear up your boat or even do harm to yourself," he says.

Navigating at idle speed is a good safety precaution any time you start seeing logs sticking up in the middle of the tributary.

"The" Andy Newcomb





ndy Newcomb has been one of the hottest and most successful anglers over the past several years. Andy moved to the Lake of the Ozarks area at five years old, his grandpa would take him fishing in the local rivers and streams, helping Andy learn how to cast and catch fish. At age 12 he would ride his bike to fish, he would fish all day from the bank when he could. Andy fished for whatever would bite, catching blue gill, catfish, bass and crappie. Andy purchased his first boat an 1988 Ranger.



He mostly launched his Ranger at Larry Gale ramp fishing for white bass, bass, crappie and again anything that would bite. He spent countless hours fishing the Nianguas and the four corners area.

Like most successful anglers, Andy is very competitive. He was an excellent baseball and basketball player and was highly competitive in slow pitch softball. When he blew out his knee playing these sports he turned his attention to competitive fishing.

In addition to fishing several team tournament trails with great success, in 2016 he started to fish the FLW Bass Fishing League (BFL) tournaments. The BFL format provides a competition format where individual anglers are competing with other anglers on an individual basis. The BFL circuit is one of the most competitive circuits in the U.S. as some of the best anglers in country that have full-time careers, which does not afford them the time to fish at a national Pro level on a full time basis. The BFL anglers are some of the absolutely best anglers in every regional geography in the country.

In his first season fishing the FLW BFL's, Andy fished four of the five tournaments, missed the fifth tournament due to ankle

surgery, he continued his fishing success fishing against all of the other regional Pro's, with two top 10 finishes, finishing 6th place on Table Rock Lake and finishing 4th place in the two day Super Tournament. Finishing 4th in the Super Tournament really lit Andy on fire, seeing his name on the list of top anglers including Dion Hibdon, Marcus Sykora, Roger Fitzpatrick, James Dill, Dennis Berhorst and others. Andy gained the confidence

that with hard work, he could compete with many of the best anglers in the region and the country.

Andy continued his drive for success in the next few years, fishing all five BFL tournaments in 2017, with two top 10 finishes and finishing 19th in the FLW Costa

Series Tournament (now Toyota Series) on Lake of the Ozarks. The Costa/Toyota series in the next level up in FLW, now Major League Fishing (MLF), with a field of national Pro's as well a regional Pro's. In 2018, Andy again had two top 10 finishes in the BFL Tournaments and finished in the money in the two day FLW Super Tournament.

Andy summarized 2017 and 2018 as learning years. While cashing some checks but a bit frustrated by not winning them. Considering Andy worked full time during these years, he really did not have much time to practice and yet with little time to practice he achieved a good measure of success on his own. Practicing when he could, doing map study, watching YouTube videos and following his own instincts. Andy did not have a mentor

> the fed him information, he simply worked it all on his own. Andy feels not having a mentor and/or listening to





dock talk from other anglers fishing stories has been to his advantage as he goes to the water with a clear head and depending only on his own study and practice.

2019 was a break out year for Andy. In only his second full FLW BFL season, Andy won Angler of the Year (AOY) in the Ozark Division. Angler of the Year is highly prestigious award, which is awarded to the angler with the most total points, points accumulate throughout season based on how high you finish in each tournament. He had a top 10 finish, always in the top 20 and lowest he finished in any of these five tournaments was 24th. In addition to his FLW success Andy and his partner finished 2nd in season long points accumulation in both the Anglers Choice tournament series and the Anglers in Action tournament series.



Andy then fished the FLW BFL Regional Tournament on Grand Lake. The regional tournament requires qualification as a top 40 angler in multiple divisions around the country. The top 6 anglers in the threeday event qualify for the All-American Championship. Andy finished 6th place and was on his way to the All-American event on Lake Hartwell and finished 25th.

In 2019 Andy also won the very prestigious Bassing Bob Missouri Invitational Fishing and Golf Championship at Old Kinderhook. As many of the tournaments that Andy has achieved success, this tournament also includes some of the best anglers in the country. In addition to the many regional Pro's, the tournament also features national Pro's Mike McClelland, Jeremy Lawyer, James Watson, Bill McDonald, Jason Vance and others. The Missouri Invitational is a three-day event, that includes two days of fishing and one day of golf. Due to weather conditions, the

2019 event was pretty much a three-day fishing event. Andy and his amateur partner, Chris Bridges won \$25,000 and etched their name on the championship trophy.

Andy continued his success in 2020, finishing 3rd in the MLF BFL points standing for Angler of the Year, having (3) top 10 finishes on Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake and Grand Lake. In addition, Andy finished 4th in the MLF Costa Series three-day tournament on Lake of the Ozarks. He and his partner continued to have many successful tournaments in the varying team tournaments on Lake of the Ozarks.

In 2021, Andy decided to fish all three of the MLF Toyota Series tournaments in the Plains Division. His goals were to win one of the three events and Angler of the Year. Those are some very lofty goals competing against some of the best anglers in the central USA. Andy achieved both of those goals, placing 2nd on Lake of the Ozarks, winning the event on Grand Lake, and finishing 8th place on very tough Lake Dardanelle. Before the tournament on Dardanelle, Andy practiced for 12 straight days, he was solely focused on winning the Angler of the Year Award. In March of 2021, Andy won the MLF/BFL on Lake of the Ozarks.

By winning the Angler of the Year, Andy qualified to fish the 2022 MLF Pro Circuit. Andy is very clear about his goals for the Pro Circuit, win one and win Angler of the Year. He is not just satisfied with qualifying he wants to win. In addition to the Pro Circuit, Andy will continue to fish all three MLF Toyota Series events and if his schedule permits, some B.A.S.S. Open Events.

With the success Andy has had he has not only earned a reputation as one of the best anglers in the country but earned enough prize money to quit his full-time job to realize his dream as pro angler on the national stage.





Andy thanks his wife Ria for her support over these past several years and her continued support going into 2022. Andy will be on the road a lot and he stated that just getting ready for a full schedule of pro fishing is a bit stressful and expensive. Preparing for 2022 Andy said that instead of working 40 hours a week, he is now working 90 hours a week. Planning his travels, working to attract sponsorships in addition to countless hours of map study for the lakes that he will be competing.

Andy has been overwhelmed by the support that he has received from his friends, family, and the community. He said that support goes a long way when being on the road competing.

He has done a great job attracting sponsors which helps to offset the expense that goes along with tournament fishing.

- > Being versatile and open minded. Not getting stuck doing the same things if its not working and being willing to change things up.
- ➤ Putting in time on the water. Including time on the water in all conditions, rain, snow, hot, no wind to big winds and make adjustments as necessary based on the conditions.
- Fishes to win. Andy does not fish for points, fish to win and the points will come.
- ➤ Does his own thing. Doesn't listen to dock talk or rely on history spots/patterns.
- Staying mentally tough and strong.
- ➤ Map study. Google Earth, Lake Master, YouTube Videos and others
- > Andy found a key spot at Grand Lake doing map study the night before the tournament's final day.
- ➤ Doing things the right way, as Andy calls it "community karma", such as when he towed another anglers boat during the Missouri Invitational Tournament. He also cut a turtle out of net during the Toyota Series tournament on Grand Lake. Andy said, "it is not always the easiest to do those things but it is rewarding".

Tournament Fishing in January & February

ven though winter isn't the busy season for tournaments, anglers wanting to get out on the lake in January and February for a competitive bass fishing experience can definitely find the opportunity to do so. Bassing Bob has added a series of winter bass fishing tournaments called the Bassing Bob Winter Bass Challenge to encourage people to come and enjoy the beauty of the lake during the colder months of the year. For more information on the Winter Bass Challenge, as well as a complete list of tournaments being held at Lake of the Ozarks organized by date, visit BassingBob.com.

Uxa advises anglers participating in tournaments during January and February that practice is probably more important than any time of the year because the bass aren't everywhere.

"When the bass are in their winter pattern, there will be a lot of blank water," says Uxa. "They will be in certain locations and you will be able to run a pattern. You just have to spend the time to find the active water."



Marcus **Sykora** on Fishing Winter **Tournaments**

Bob Bassing interviewed Marcus Sykora, well-known

tournament bass fisherman from the Lake of the Ozarks who strongly encourages anglers to come out and fish the competitions in January and February.

"Winter at Lake of the Ozarks is one of the few times of the year when you can catch not only the most fish in one outing, but also the biggest fish of the year," says Marcus. "Also, you can't beat fishing the lake in the winter months for the sheer tranquility; it's the most relaxing, beautiful, and peaceful time of the year."

Q: How do you pre-fish for a tournament in January or February?

A: I like to focus on points within larger creeks and transitions where the size of the rock along the shoreline changes. Those are the places where it's easiest to find the fish. Once Ameren does the drawdown and the lake level is low, you can really see the rock composition and transitions.

If I were starting from scratch and wasn't familiar with this lake, I'd go into a smaller cove, start on main lake and then fish all the way around the cove.

Everywhere I got a bite, I'd document where that was and note whether it was a point, a channel swing, a rock transition, or anything that's unique about that spot. Then I'd go to the next cove and try to repeat that success to find a pattern.

Q: What strategies do you use to find the fish, and where are you most likely to find them in January and February?

A: It's all about the bait, all about the forage. If you can find the forage, you increase your odds significantly, whether you've found it on the main lake, at the very back of the cove, or somewhere in between. So I base my plan around where I've found the forage. The reason jerkbait is so deadly in wintertime is that it's an exact matchthe-hatch forage. Shad are very delicate creatures, and very sensitive to life and death in the winter. When the water gets into a certain temperature range, they start dying off. Their metabolism is very slow, and their death process is very slow.

A suspending jerkbait mimics these dying shad. As you allow the jerkbait to suspend, and then twitch it down, you're mimicking a shad as it dies. You're showing the bass something that looks like an easy meal during a time when their own slowing metabolism means they'll only put so much energy into going after their prey.

Another important thing: I try to find places where the wind hits the bank at a 90-degree angle. This pushes the fish up on the bank, blows them into shallower water and makes them easier to catch. Wind also helps creates a lower light environment, which bunches up the shad and creates a more active foodchain. If you can relate to the bank, that's very helpful. Around docks, I might try throwing a suspended jerkbait on the windblown shady side of the dock in the deeper part of the cove.

Q: How do you decide what part of the lake to fish?

A: I almost always fish the lower end of the lake in the winter. Water clarity is such an important factor at this time of the year and the Bagnell Dam end of the lake is usually pretty clear. Also, because there's so much more water there, it's historically warmer; it's deeper and so it's a lot more stable.

Q: If it's a buddy tournament, what do you do to complement each other out on the lake?

A: We'll both be fishing as slow as we can, and our presentation will probably be very similar. But the other person might be throwing a different version of the bait, maybe a different manufacturer, or change up the color pattern. For example, I might be using something natural while my fishing partner may throw something a little brighter or wilder in color.

Q: You are well known for your focus on brushpiles in the winter. What makes fishing brushpiles so effective for you?

A: First of all, I personally sink over 100 trees in the lake each year. I believe a successful bass fisherman is one who finds the places where opportunity and preparation meet. By sinking my own brushpiles, I'm creating more opportunities for myself. Brushpiles are incredibly effective as a form of cover, and a key location piece. When I'm fishing with a jerkbait and I know I'm directly over a good piece of cover, I'm more confident, and that confidence helps me catch big bass. It will help other anglers too; that's where preparation and doing your own legwork comes into play. The better prepared you are, the better you'll do in a tournament.

Q: Most anglers say winter fishing is all about three things: jerkbait, jigs and the Alabama rig. What's your preference, and what advice can you give anglers to help them catch a big bass in the winter? A: I don't find jigs to be as efficient as the jerkbait, so I rarely use a jig when the bass

are in their winter pattern. I'd say 97-99% of winter tournaments will be won with a jerkbait. Here are a few specifics I can share about how I like to fish a jerkbait:

- I like to use .060 lead wire wrapped around the front hook of the jerkbait to make sure it's perfectly suspended. I prefer wire over SuspenDots because the dots can fall off without you realizing it. I want my bait completely suspended, maybe sinking a little, in the 6- to 10-foot range.
- I twitch the jerkbait down to my desired depth. The most important thing is where you throw it and how long it sits still. Count as you let it sit: one-one thousand, two-one thousand, etc., all the way to a 14 or 15 count. When you get a bite, remember where



you were in your count, and that will give you your guideline for how long you need to let the bait sit still.

 Make sure you have the right rod, reel and line set up for throwing a jerkbait. I prefer 8 lb. test monofilament and a basic standard reel with a 6.2 gear ratio. My preferred rod to use on a relatively windless day is a 6'8" 4-power rod. If you're fishing on a day when there's a lot of wave action, you need to switch to a heavier rod to deal with the bow the wind will put in your line. You have to be able to take the bow out of the line before you can set the hook, and the wrong rod can cause you to lose your fish. So on days when there's extreme wind chop, I recommend going with a heavier rod.



Q: There's a ton of options in the jerkbait market. What's one of your go to jerkbaits?

A: I really like the 6th sense Provoke series jerkbait. It's something totally different than the other baits. It has a much more durable bill, it's wider across the back, taller sides and has a ton of realistic and unique colors. It also won't break the bank. I view it more as a shad bait versus a minnow style bait. I love the hooks on it as well, especially when the water warms up and the fish begin jumping. It has erratic action or a nice subtle roll.

Q: How do you feel about using the Alabama rig to fish tournaments in the

A: The Alabama rig is a very powerful bait. If I were a weekend warrior, that's all I'd use. It's fun to throw, exciting to use and it does a great job of catching fish. I like to rig mine with Zoom Swimmin Super Flukes. Missouri law requires that only three of the five baits on the rig have hooks, so I'll make the top two the dummy

This is a very expensive bait to use, and the start-up cost is pretty high. Keep in mind that not all tournaments allow anglers to use the Alabama rig, so make sure you read the regulations before you use it. But if the tournament you're fishing in DOES allow use of the Alabama rig, you pretty much have to stay married to it and throw it every single cast to stay in the game.

Only the top 10 anglers in the rankings receive an invitation to the 2022 Bass Pro Tour. Five of the top 10 anglers who qualified (Michael Neal, Skeet Reese, Justin Lucas, Cody Meyer and Mike McClelland) already fish the Bass Pro Tour and have thus requalified for the 2022 season through the Pro Circuit. The other five anglers (Ryan Salzman, Cole Floyd, Ron Nelson, Clabion Johns and Jeremy Lawyer) will be new to the Bass Pro Tour and considered rookies for the 2022 season.

The full 2022 Bass Pro Tour schedule is expected to be announced in early September. The complete rosters for the 2022 Bass Pro Tour and the 2022 Tackle Warehouse Pro Circuit will be announced later this fall.

Catching Bass in January & February

Finding the Fish

In some ways, fishing Lake of the Ozarks in January and February is less complex than in other months because it really comes down to three baits: a jerkbait, jig and the a-rig. The trick to successful bass fishing at this time of the year is figuring out where the fish are and slowing things down. "In January and February, you're still looking for schools of baitfish, because that's where the bass will be," says Uxa. "Finding the baitfish may be even more important in these months than others. You just have to get out there and look around."

In January and February, you're still looking for schools of shad, because that's where the bass will be. This shad is 8 inches long and is probably 2-3 years old.



Greg Stoner, formerly the Missouri Department of Conservation Fisheries Management Biologist at Lake of the Ozarks, says the smallest shad in the lake in January and February will be those that were spawned the previous spring, and will be about 3 to 4 inches in length.

"Gizzard shad can get pretty big," says Stoner. "The largest I've personally seen was 19 inches! I'm not certain how big of a shad a bass will try to tackle, but it does depend to some extent on the size of a bass. I did have a bass in the 21-inch range cough up a 10-inch crappie on my measuring board. A hungry bass can get pretty ambitious!"

A common mistake anglers make when fishing in the winter is assuming the bass are all suspended in deep water. "I've caught bass in January and February in some pretty shallow water, but the key is that the deep water is nearby," says Uxa. He suggests starting your search with the steep banks in the coves, especially those with big rock along the shoreline. Other good places to begin your search are bluff ends, points, channel banks and swings, and places along the shoreline where there's a transition, like a change in the size of the rocks.

"If you have electronics on your boat and see fish on your fish finder," Uxa advises, "slow the boat down and start fishing. This is a time of year when you really have to go slow and make a cast last, sometimes 2 or 2 ½ minutes. Remember that the bass won't go after anything that's moving too fast now that their metabolism has slowed down for the winter. You need

to make whatever you throw out there look like an easy meal."

Uxa says bluff ends are a prime place to throw a jerkbait or an Alabama rig in January and February. "If there's current, you should check out some of the tuckedin spots around these bluff ends where the fish are protected from the current," he says. "If the water level is going down, they'll key on steeper banks and bluffs."

Docks don't play as big a role in the wintertime as they do in other months, but docks can produce shade, and even in the winter, sometimes the bass seem to like the shade. "If it's a sunny day and you're not getting a bite in the more usual winter hangouts," suggests Uxa, "try throwing an Alabama rig parallel to docks in the shady areas, especially if you know there's a brushpile there."

Another good bit of advice from Uxa is to follow the wind. "Wind can really have

a positive effect on your day out on the lake," he says. "It's one of the factors I look for to help me catch active fish. Even just a little breeze can help by pushing the fish into shallower water. I look especially for the places where the wind is hitting rocky banks or docks at a right angle."

In the winter, most anglers will opt to fish the lower end of the lake where the water is clearest. "The clearer the water you're fishing in the winter, the better," says Uxa. "You want the bass to see your bait so they'll come up and get it. Remember that fish feed up. They may be suspended down to 10-12 feet, but they're looking up, so you need to work your lure down to where they'll see it. Depending on how clear the water is, that may be as shallow as 4-5 feet. That's why even in winter you might catch fish in fairly shallow waters even though they're suspending in deeper water than that."

Uxa says conditions tend to remain fairly constant in the winter months, so not much changes in how you fish in January and February. "Even an unseasonably warm day won't make much of a difference in the middle of winter," he says. "It might pull them up a little bit higher, but usually you need two or three days of warmer weather in a row to change anything. Remember though, a one-degree difference in water temperature can really change things up and make the fish more active, or they may gravitate to the part of the lake where it's just a little warmer."

On the other end of the weather spectrum are the days of real winter weather. "While you do need to take extra safety precautions on days when you have icy or snowy conditions," says Uxa, "most anglers will tell you that if it's snowing, it's probably going to be great fishing, and it's absolutely beautiful."

Most anglers will tell you that sometimes it seems like the worse the weather, the better the fishing! But Uxa says that you do need to take extra precautions when the weather forecast calls for ice or snow. "Wear a life jacket in case you slip and fall in the water," he cautions. "Mustang-style life jackets are good because they inflate if you fall in, but the rest of the time you hardly know you've got one on so they don't get in the way."

Boat ramps get icy, as do the boat decks so be careful when conditions get icy or snowy. Take extra changes of clothes, and be prepared for how cold it will be when you're running the boat. Every angler on the lake who fishes regularly in the winter has found specific things that work for them to stay warm but in general you want to layer your clothes, take extras in case you get wet, and be aware that you'll need extra warmth for times when your boat is moving.

It's also a good idea to check regularly for ice forming on the line guides of your rod. If this happens, dip the rod in the water and move it around until the ice comes off. The ice can damage the line and have negative effects on your casting and hook setting.

Uxa likes the ½ oz. MegaBass ITO Vision 110 jerkbait for actively feeding bass. Sometimes he'll put a SuspenDot on the throat so it will gradually sink, but

notes that some anglers prefer to use lead wire wrapped around the top of one of the hooks to add weight instead of using the dots. "To get your jerkbait to sink and suspend the way you like it," he says, "you may need to customize your

lure with additional strategically-placed weight. Storm SuspenDots [also available as SuspenStrips] are small weights with adhesive backing that can be applied to modify the action of a lure. These are very pliable weights that you can bend or fold. Put the weight in the middle if you want the bait to sink levelly, though I like it to have a little tilt downward. When I want to fish a little deeper, I'll use a Lucky Craft Bevy Shad; this one will automatically go down a little deeper than the MegaBass."

Uxa says that at this time of the year, the bass will take more time to inspect the lure and sometimes the more commonly used colors just won't be what they want. "Normally you can't go wrong with lures that mimic a baitfish," he says. "I like to use something with a little blue, a little shine, gold when it's cloudy, silver when it's clear.

A couple of my favorite jerkbait colors for January and February are Aurora Black and French Pearl. But sometimes if I'm not having any luck with these, I'll throw some wacky color and that'll do the trick!"



10 Trolling Motor Maintenance Tips

This trolling motor maintenance checklist will help you keep your Minn Kota running like new for years to come.

rguably the most important tool on your fishing boat is your trolling motor. Can you guess which tool takes the most abuse on your boat? It's likely your trolling motor. They get bumped against stumps, rocks, docks, ran for hours on end, and abused by weather.



Minn Kota® trolling motors have been around for over 86 years and they're the toughest out there, but that doesn't mean periodic maintenance should be ignored.

We're going to break down the most important trolling motor maintenance and care procedures for all trolling motors to keep them running like new for years to

A little bit of TLC goes a long way in keeping this important fishing tool in good condition.

Check and Tighten Battery Connections

Poor connections to batteries are one of the most common sources of trolling motor problems. All trolling motors require a clean connection to power to run effectively.

While this doesn't necessarily extend the life of your trolling motor, it does prevent unwanted headaches during your valuable time on the water.



Simply pull out your wrench or socket and check that all connection points are snug. While you are there, check the battery terminals and wires for corrosion. Give them a quick clean with fine sandpaper or emery cloth and replace any corroded wires.

It's also important to check any additional connection points, for example, where your trolling motor wire meets a terminal ring. If it's loose, re-snug or replace the terminal ring.

Frequency: It only takes a minute, so it may be good to check every or every other outing depending on how often you fish.

Properly Charge Your Trolling Motor Batteries

Your batteries are the lifeblood of your trolling motor and keeping them in a healthy state is the most critical piece to trolling motor performance.

For maximum battery life, recharge the battery as soon as possible after every use. For best motor performance, restore the battery to full charge prior to use.

Also, consider adding an On-Board Charger to simplify your charging process and to confirm that you apply the proper charge for your battery type to ensure a long lifespan.

Frequency: After every use.

Clean Trolling Motor Prop of Weeds and Fishing Line

We take our trolling motors and boats into thick vegetation, stump fields, dirt shallow bays, and other areas that can gunk up our trolling motor prop. Many of these areas are spots where other anglers have gotten baits snagged and broken off.

Stray fishing line can damage your motor more than you might think. It's critical to remove any fishing line or weeds that you've picked up over the course of a fishing day because if line or weeds get behind the prop, it can damage the seals and allow water to enter the lower unit of the motor - causing much bigger headaches.



9/16 Socket to Remove Prop

Not only is it important to pull off any grass or fishing line during your day of fishing, but it's also important to remove your prop completely and do a deeper inspection for weeds and fishing line that has crept behind your prop.

Disconnect power, break out that socket (9/16) or wrench, pull off your propeller, and remove all vegetation and fishing line that has wrapped around the trolling motor prop shaft.

Frequency: Clean vegetation off of prop during and after every outing. Remove prop and inspect for vegetation and fishing line after every few uses - it only takes a

Remove and Inspect Trolling Motor Prop Drive Pin

While your prop is off, it's a good time to check the Prop Drive Pin for wear or to check if it is bent.

Remember that time that you were trolling along and slammed into a stump or rock? Those moments are where your prop pin can be bent or broken. They are designed to bend or break under pressure to prevent greater damage from happening to your prop and driveshaft.

Luckily, these pins can be quickly and easily replaced.

Make sure you reference your trolling motor owner's manual for in-depth guidelines.

Frequency: 2-4 times a year or more depending on how often you fish.

Wash Your Trolling Motor -Especially When Fishing In Saltwater

Freshwater trolling motors: Spray down your entire trolling motor with water to lightly clean the motor when you're able (ideally after every few uses).



Saltwater trolling motors: Just as important as spraying down your boat, it is also important to rinse your trolling motor with fresh water after every trip when fishing in saltwater environments!

Lubricating Your Trolling Motor

Next time you give your boat a wash, don't forget to lubricate your trolling motor shaft.

This can be done after you have cleaned your trolling motor with water and a mild soap solution and wiped dry.




Grab a bottle of Pledge® multipurpose cleaner, Armor All®, or another water-based* silicone spray and apply some spray to a soft cloth, and wipe down the composite trolling motor shaft.

This lubrication helps ensure smooth deployment and stowing of your trolling motor, especially on electric steer motors.



*Important – Make sure the spray chosen is aqueous-based, NOT oil-based! Avoid wood polish spray as they contain oil.

Frequency: Freshwater trolling motors - Every few uses. Saltwater trolling motors - After every use.



Tighten Mounting Bolts

Vibration is the worst enemy of most marine equipment, and when mounting bolts become loose or a stabilizer bar is not holding tight to the deck of the boat, bushings and other moving parts can take serious abuse - especially when running in heavy waves and chop.



Check all mounting points and tighten. Frequency: Depends on how often you fish, but a couple of times a year is best and before/after your fishing season.

Prolonged Storage Prep

Lightly coat all metal parts with an aqueous/water-based silicone spray or Pledge cleaner like mentioned above.

Spray into a soft cloth and simply dab or wipe all metal parts of the trolling motor.



Disconnect the trolling motor from its power source/battery prior to storing.

As mentioned in the first two tips, we recommend connecting your batteries to a smart on-board battery charger to apply the perfect charge over long periods of time.

Frequency: Prior to long-term storage before offseason.

Trolling Motor Cable Management and Inspection

Using zip ties and/or PET expandable braided sleeving are easy and cheap ways to clean up any excess cables you may have near your trolling motor.



When stowing cable steer style bow mount motors like Ultrex™ (Mono-Arm), Fortrex® (Mono-Arm), Edge, and Maxxum® you should be mindful of the power and built-in transducer cables and how they lay down because if not routed properly, they can get caught inside of the bracket and are susceptible to being pinched or even cut. Allow your cables to fall in a safe place and it's often a good idea to protect them with any of the following solutions.

Popular cable management solutions include:

- PET Expandable Braided Sleeving
- TH Marine G-Force Troll Jacket Organizer Sleeves
- DD26 Trolling Motor Cable Management Sleeve Wrap

Frequency: Initial install to ensure cables are clear of pinching and inspection of cables routinely throughout the year

Steering Cable Tension Adjustment -**Cable Steer Motors Only**

The steering cable tension is pre-set at the factory but, through normal use, it may need occasional adjustment to ensure the proper "feel" when steering (Ultrex, Fortrex, Maxxum, and Edge Models).

BONUS: Weedless Prop Performance

The Minn Kota Weedless Wedge 2™ prop is designed to provide weed-free operation with very high efficiency. To maintain this performance, it's important that the prop blades are kept smooth.


As your prop bounces off of rocks, stumps and other hard objects it can get nicked or roughed up.



If this happens, you can smooth the prop blades by sanding them with very fine sandpaper to ensure its weedless effectiveness.

See our Trolling Motor Propeller Selection Guide if you need to replace a prop.

Frequency: Once a year or situational as needed.




Adjust the tension of the cables by turning the cable tension adjustment screw (Phillips pan-head screw) located near the bottom of the foot pedal, just under the steering cable cover.

Turn the screw clockwise to increase tension and counter-clockwise to decrease tension.

Frequency: When/if you feel a noticeable change in foot pedal tension.

Put these basic trolling motor maintenance tips to use after your next fishing trip and keep your motor running like new.

Building your 6th Sense: Jerkbait Fishing

Tt is no secret the jerkbait is a lure that has the power to catch fish in nearly any body of water. Whether you are

fishing stained water in Louisiana, tannic water in Florida, or clear water in the Great Lakes, a jerkbait is a valuable tool that should be included in every angler's arsenal. However, in order to experience top-level success with this technique there are several different variables to consider when throwing a jerkbait. Our team at 6th Sense laid out this playbook to help you understand different conditions and hopefully help you catch more fish with your Provoke 106X Jerkbait.

Water Clarity

The presentation of a jerkbait revolves heavily around a fish's eyesight. In the right conditions, this lure and its action can draw fish in from extreme distances. Water clarity is a very important factor that can help you determine what color jerkbait you should throw.

Clearer water will often call for a more natural or translucent presentation. 6th Sense colors such as 'Ghost Bone Minnow' or 'Shad Burst' are excellent options to "provoke" strikes from fish that can see every detail of your lure.



Ghost Bone Minnow and Shad Burst

Moderately clear water (2'-4' visibility) is perfect territory for some of our flashier color patterns like 'Shad Pro' or 'Chrome Threadfin.' These colors provide just enough contrast to catch a fish's eye without being too bold.

To compliment those muddy water situations, such as a typically dirty lake or after a rain where there is runoff, we recommend bright 6th Sense colors such as 'Gold Reactor' or 'French Bone Pearl.' These color schemes are extremely bright and can provide enough flash to attract fish in low visibility conditions.

Structure

This Provoke 106X can be fished around many different types of cover, such as docks, rocks, and standing timber. Throwing a jerkbait around this kind of structure can entice fish to come out of their protected environment and strike.



In addition, you can also rip this bait through hydrilla with the right gear. For this situation, we recommend throwing 15-17 lb. test fluorocarbon. Heavier line will make it easier to snap this bait out of grass and give you a better chance of landing bigger fish.

Water Temperature

The #1 effect water temperature has on fishing a jerkbait is retrieval speed and cadence. Knowing when to snap your Provoke 106X faster or slower will help you catch more fish when you are out on

When fishing in colder water, it would behoove you to implement a slower retrieve and longer pauses between twitches. The fact of the matter is, fish are cold-blooded animals and as water temperatures begin to cool, baitfish movements will naturally become slower.

On the other hand, fishing in warmer water will allow you to fish faster with less of a pause in between twitches.

Try these different speeds and delays, you might just put more fish in your boat.

Line

The line diameter you choose can be a major key to getting the most out of your jerkbait presentation. To start, we always recommend using some sort of fluorocarbon. This type of line has very little stretch and it sinks, which allows you to get the most depth and erratic action out of your bait. From here you need to consider the depth range you are looking to target. The Provoke 106x will typically achieve a depth of 5' on a long cast with standard 12-pound test fluorocarbon. However, if you fish it on 15-pound test fluorocarbon it will not dive as deep. Heavier line can be beneficial when fishing around shallow vegetation so you can keep your jerkbait above the grass and attract those reaction strikes. In contrast, dowsizing to an 8-pound line will greatly increase your bait's diving depth. This will help in open water when you find baitfish or schooling bass. If you consider your line diameter in different situations, you will more likely be successful.

Rod

The purpose of a good jerkbait rod is to have enough backbone to crisply snap and twitch the bait but enough forgiveness in the tip of the rod to not tear hooks out of a fish's mouth. This technique can, and will be, fatiguing on your elbows and wrists. However, to minimize this issue, we recommend using a rod that is 7' or shorter. A great rod used by many 6th Sense pros is the Lux 6'9" medium, moderate-fast. By using a shorter rod, you can snap, twitch, and jerk the bait for longer periods of time with ease. Using a more compact rod will also increase casting accuracy, which is crucial while fishing around structure like trees and docks. This will give you more time fishing and less time hanging up.

If you implement these techniques and consider the conditions in which you are fishing, you will have a better chance of landing more fish using your Provoke 106X Jerkbait.





lthough younger reservoirs appeal to an angler's eye with flooded timber and undeveloped shorelines, the Lake of the Ozarks entices fishermen with its hidden charms. This 54,000-acre lake lost most of its natural cover when the standing timber was cleared before the lake was formed. New cover has developed over the years as dock owners and anglers have planted brush piles throughout the impoundment. Other fish-holding structure includes steep bluffs, creek channels, humps, and points. Docks provide plenty of shelter for a variety of fish, while laydowns and log jams are the primary cover for bass, crappie and catfish in the undeveloped sections of the lake.

The various arms of the lake offer diverse water clarity and structure so anglers can catch fish on a wide range of tactics. The Osage arm runs 98 miles from Bagnell Dam to Truman Dam and changes drastically from one end to the other. The North Shore section close on the lower end contains some of the deepest and clearest water on the lake, while the upper Osage near Warsaw narrows until it turns riverine in appearance with the water remaining stained to murky most of the time. The winding Niangua arm resembles a large river more than a reservoir since it has few major coves and a narrow main channel for most of its length.

The 10-mile Gravois arm is one of the oldest developed sections of the lake so its shoreline is dotted with boat docks. Fed by the gin-clear waters of the Gravois, Little Gravois, Spring Branch, Soap, Indian and Mill creeks, this arm usually remains one of the clearest sections of the lake throughout the year. The Grand Glaize arm runs about 16 miles from its confluence with the Osage arm to the swinging bridges

area where the Glaize narrows down to a stream.

If variety is indeed the spice of life, then Lake of the Ozarks spices anglers' lives with its smorgasbord of fishing opportunities. The lake rates as one of the best reservoirs in Missouri for catching a variety of game fish. Largemouth bass and crappie are the most sought-after fish at the lake, but catfish, white bass, walleye and sunfish also offer plenty of action throughout the year.

The Missouri Department of Conservation's 9-inch minimum length limit on crappie has helped keep crappie fishing consistently good throughout the year. Limits of keeper-size crappie can be taken in the shallows from March through May and again in October through early December. The key to catching crappie the rest of the year is to find some of the hundreds of brush piles sunken at various depths throughout the lake.

The lake is also loaded with keeper-size bass thanks to the Missouri Department of Conservation's 15-inch minimum length regulation on black bass. Renowned for its bass fishing, Lake of the Ozarks draws numerous tournaments ranging in size from 10-boat bass club events to 150-boat national circuit contests, which are held each weekend just about year-round. With this sort of attention, the lake receives plenty of fishing pressure, yet still yields heavyweight stringers of bass to tournament competitors.

White bass are another popular catch in the spring and the fall. Local anglers head for the riffles in the major creeks and tributaries to catch spawning whites in April and May. In the fall, they target wind-blown points and pockets to track down white bass chasing baitfish.

Lake of the Ozarks catfish are an obliging sort. They will eat just about anything you put on a hook and can be taken on a variety of methods throughout the warmer months. The three most popular species to catch at the lake are channel, blue (or white cats as the local anglers call them) and flathead catfish. The lake has a reputation for yielding big blue cats each year and has also produced a former state record flathead catfish, a 66-pounder caught by Howard Brownfield in 1987.

Three state record fish have come from the Lake of the Ozarks. Gene Snelling caught a state record muskellunge (41 pounds, 2 ounces) in 1981; Allen Schweiss landed a 36-pound, 12-ounce smallmouth buffalo in 1986; and Ronald Wagner made the record book in 1980 with a 40-pound, 8-ounce freshwater drum.

Several marinas and resorts rent boat to visiting anglers who don't own one and want to venture out on the water. Newcomers to the lake also can have a rewarding day on the water by hiring a Coast-Guard licensed guide.

Customers at the various lake resorts on the lake can enjoy catching crappie, bass bluegill and catfish from the docks that the resort owners enhance by sinking brush piles in multiple locations.


