

ntimidated or confused? Don't be: This blog will clearly show you how to perform each step.

Every boat owner should know how to remove and install the boat's propeller. The prop may become damaged and need to be repaired or replaced. You may decide to upgrade your propeller to improve performance or economy. Inspecting the propeller shaft behind the propeller for twisted fishing line is an easy maintenance check you should do several times a season to prevent serious gearcase damage.

Fortunately, swapping out a propeller is far easier and faster than changing a flat tire on your vehicle. With a few basic tools you can remove and install a propeller in a matter of minutes. Most Mercury outboards and MerCruiser® sterndrives in service today use a Flo-Torq® modular hub system. Always note the order and orientation of washers and other components as you disassemble the hub, consult the instructions if installing a new hub, or check your engine owner's manual. These are the basic instructions for the Flo-Torq II hub:

- 1. Pry back the locking tabs of the locknut retainer with a flat screwdriver.
- 2. Remove the propeller nut using a prop wrench or deep well socket and a floating prop block (or a wood block) to keep the prop from spinning.
- 3. Remove the propeller and all hub components, including the thrust washer.
- 4. Lubricate the prop shaft with Mercury 2-4-C Marine Grease and reinstall the

- thrust washer facing the correct way.
- 5. Insert the Flo-Torq hub assembly into the propeller.
- 6. Slide the new prop/hub assembly and the lock-nut retainer onto the prop shaft.
- 7. Tighten the prop nut using your wrench and block, then tighten to specification using a torque wrench. Consult your owner's manual to find torque specification for your model.
- 8. Use a screwdriver to bend the ears of the lock-nut retainer back into the locked position.
- 9. Finally, give the prop a quick spin by hand to ensure that it can easily turn 360 degrees without binding, and you're ready to get back on the water.

Other points to consider:

- ► Spare your day: Getting stranded on the water due to a damaged propeller or spun prop hub will ruin your day and threaten your safety. It's a great idea to keep a spare propeller, Flo-Torq hub kit and the tools needed to change the prop on board. Now you can turn the situation into a minor delay instead of a day spoiler. Many boaters opt to carry an affordable aluminum propeller as a spare.
- ► Avoid something fishy: Several times a season remove the propeller to check the prop shaft for an accumulation of fishing line. When line is discarded or lost in the water

- it will float. When a boat passes over the line, it can become tangled in the prop. Eventually, the line can work its way into the gap between the propeller hub and the gearcase, get wrapped round the prop shaft, and eat its way through the prop shaft seal. This can be very bad news – if the seal fails, water can enter the gearcase and cause expensive damage. The fishing line can be imbedded in grease and hard to see. Use your fingernail or a sharp pick to look for line at the point where the prop shaft goes into the gearcase. Pull off the line and reinstall the propeller.
- ► Feeling sluggish? If your boat isn't performing up to expectations, check your propeller(s). A damaged prop or one that's not the ideal model or pitch can drastically impede all aspects of performance. In fact, a new highquality, well-chosen propeller is often the cheapest and fastest way to make a boat run better. Consult your local Mercury Authorized Dealer or find a dealer for guidance. Many dealers carry test propellers so you can compare several before you buy.

Building your 6th Sense: Spring Time Transition

s the days get longer and water temperatures across the United States rise, waves of bass anglers will flock to the bank in search of fish that are looking to spawn. While this is a classic pattern, it is sometimes not the best move because of intense fishing pressure or unstable weather conditions. One way to bi-pass these issues and set yourself apart from the crowd is to consider targeting bass that are staging.

What is a Staging Area?

To get a better idea of how this pattern works, look back at your own traveling habits. Most people have a favorite restaurant/gas station that they habitually stop by on their way to and from any given destination. A staging area for a bass is no different. These areas can basically be any place that they can stop and use to feed before moving to or away from their desired spawning grounds. To help identify these areas, it is important to consider several factors. First, be cognizant of the type of cover the bass in your local lake prefer to stage in. This can be hydrilla, brush, secondary points, etc. By doing this you can oftentimes find a pattern that can be replicated on different areas of the lake. Also, consider depth/deep water access. Nearby creek channel swings and steep drop offs can amplify the number of fish that will use a particular spot for staging.

Types of Staging Areas:

Docks - While it may seem obvious, docks are a great piece of cover for bass to stage. The shade and overhead protection afforded by these pieces of structure make bass feel generally safe and protected. More specifically, bass will utilize individual dock pilings for several things during the spring. Early in the year the dock pilings will absorb sunlight and create a warm surface for fish to sit against which can be key during frigid weather. Later in the spring, shad will spawn on pilings which provides a consistent food source for fish living nearby.

Brush - Isolated brush piles can prove to be an excellent stopping point for fish in different phases of the spawn. Bass will hide in this type of cover and use it as a place to ambush baitfish. To locate these piles of structure it is best to utilize some sort of side imaging sonar. Pay attention to where you find brush piles because anglers who are dropping them in the water will drop them all over the lake in similar depths and points.

Points - These areas can be identified

with the naked eye or a contour map of your lake. Bass will use these as a feeding zone as well as a place to suspend. Points with deep water access allow fish to move up and down the water column without having to travel far which saves them time and energy during unstable spring weather conditions. Any sort of isolated rock, hard bottom, or other structure along a point can serve as an excellent place for schools of bass to stage. Another key factor that can affect the way fish will use a point is wind. Most of the time if you can find a point with wind blowing into it there will be bass feeding nearby. This is because the current generated by the wind will push bait fish around and allow bass to ambush them as they swim by.

Roadbeds - Much like dock pilings, roadbeds also absorb heat and provide a place for shad to spawn. Both elements are driving factors that attract pre spawn and post spawn bass. If timed correctly, entire schools of bass will position on this type of structure.

Recommended Baits and Techniques:

Tried and true, a Carolina-rig is a great option to drag around points, roadbeds, and brush piles. Our recommended setup includes 20lb fluorocarbon line, a tungsten or lead Carolina Pre-Rig, and a Stout 4/0 hook. The Nedfry and Clout are both great soft plastics to use on this setup. However, a less known option that is also highly effective is a Flush 5.2 soft plastic jerkbait. The subtle action of this bait imitating an injured baitfish is enough to entice finicky fish into eating.



Provoke - The Provoke 106x jerkbait is a dynamite bait to fish around docks, points, and shallow roadbeds. This bait has a unique ability to draw fish in from long distances. This has proven to be extremely effective for bass that are feeding heavily on baitfish. 'Chrome Threadfin', 'French Bone Pearl', and 'Jaint Juice' are some of our favorite colors for this technique.



Whale - Like the Provoke 106x, this bait also can draw fish in from long distances. With a wide tail kick and exaggerated head wobble, the Whale can be fished at almost any depth depending on how it is rigged. An often-overlooked element associated with this bait is its ability to skip extremely far under docks. Rigged on a 5/0 keel weighted hook, this bait is a great option to catch bass that are targeting baitfish.



Shakey Head – This bait is a more subtle approach to use around staging areas. Simply drag and hop this bait around points, roadbeds, or any type of submerged structure to elicit strikes from bass. Our recommended setup for this technique is a 3/8oz Divine Shakey Head paired with a Divine Shakey Worm 6.3.



Crankbait - A crankbait is one of our favorite lures to fish around staging areas since it allows you to cover so much water and incite reaction strikes from fish that may not be actively feeding. Depending on depth, we recommend the Cloud 9 series of crankbaits for this technique. Some of our favorite colors in this line up are 'Chartreuse Pro Blue', 'Shad Scales', and 'Threadfin Shad'.



Be sure to apply this knowledge the next time you get out on the water, you might just put more fish in your live well.







every size," Uxa says. "The Ned Rig works exceptionally well in rocky situations. You can throw it in vegetation areas but it doesn't seem to shine in places with a lot of vegetation."

The Lake of the Ozarks guide sets up his Ned Rig with a 1/8-ounce mushroomshaped jighead that he modifies by drilling a hole in the top of the jig and gluing a piece of 50-pound test fluorocarbon into the hole to create a weed guard. Uxa occasionally matches the jighead with small soft plastic creature baits and craws, but he prefers rigging the jighead with the buoyant plastic stickworm such as the Z-Man TRD or the Z-Man ZinkerZ. He cuts the 5-inch ZinkerZ in half to make a more compact Ned Rig. Both the TRD and ZinkerZ are made from ElazTech material which is naturally buoyant and allows the finesse worm to float off the bottom.

When fishing in clear water Uxa selects Ned Rig worms in green hues such as green pumpkin, sprayed grass and green pumpkin/purple flake. The Ned Rig has also produced for him in dirty water with a visibility of less than 1 foot. He opts for a black-and-blue stickworm for his rig in the off-colored water.

Spinning gear and light line are imperative when fishing the lightweight Ned Rig. Uxa throws his Ned Rig on a 6-foot, 10-inch medium action Abu-Garcia Villain spinning rod combined with a Pflueger President 30 spinning reel. He avoids the hassle of tying fluorocarbon leaders on braid line by fishing the Ned Rig exclusively on 6- or 8-pound Berkley Trilene XL monofilament line.

Retrieving the Ned Rig a variety of ways will generate strikes. "There are times where I will scrub it along the bottom, which is a steady retrieve similar to fishing with a wobble head jig," Uxa says. "There are times I will work it along the bottom like I would a plastic worm but a little bit slower because it is lighter weight. There are also times when I will just swim it back. All the retrieves are slow. I just have to play around with it to see where the fish are in the water column."

Dead-sticking the Ned Rig while eating an apple will also trigger bites from finicky bass.

The apple-eating incident proves you can never fish a Ned Rig too slow. Uxa notices the biggest mistake his clients make is putting too much action on the Ned Rig. "They just fish it too fast," he says.

The veteran guide suggests to his clients that the rig works best when they fish it slow and if they think they are fishing it slow, they should go even slower. "When bass want something moving, there are other baits that work better," Uxa says.

The Ned Rig shines best for Uxa during early spring when several weather fronts keep passing through and bass ignore action lures such as spinnerbaits and crankbaits. The rig has produced for him on calm, sunny days, but he has also caught bass on it during other weather conditions when bass still want a slow-moving bait.

Uxa will also throw the finesse bait any time he notices bass seem to prefer smaller meals, especially on waters with high fishing pressure. The rig has saved the day many times for Uxa on guide trips while targeting pressured bass at Lake of the Ozarks, where more than 500 bass tournament permits are issued throughout the year.

The rig racks up good numbers of fish generating lots of bites from bass in the 1-pound class and Uxa's clients also catch some 3- and 4-pounders. "You will also occasionally catch a crappie, white bass, catfish and bluegill on it," Uxa says.



KISSIMMEE, Fla. - Kevin VanDam - the all-time winningest angler in the history of professional bass fishing - announced Monday that the 2023 Bass Pro Tour season will be his last as a full-time touring pro. VanDam, who will compete this week on Florida's Kissimmee Chain of Lakes at B&W Trailer Hitches Stage One presented by Grundéns, released a video on his personal social media detailing his departure from a sport that he has excelled at for over three decades.

"I'm just about to start my 33rd season as a touring bass professional - and man, what a ride it's been," VanDam said. "But I'm here today to announce that this is going to be my last season fishing professionally on tour. Being on tour is tough. Spending so much time on the road is hard on your family, and I've done it for a really long time and have had so many great memories. I'm very proud of the

long-term friendships, relationships and partnerships I've been able to make over the years, and that's something that I really look forward to continuing in the future."

The greatest of all time

VanDam's fishing résumé is unmatched in the history of the sport. An eight-time winner of major tour-level Angler of the Year (AOY) titles (1992, 1996, 1999, 2001, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011), the Michigan native has collected just over \$7 million in tournament winnings and 26 tour-level wins in his storied career (all records).

The winner of four Bassmaster Classics. VanDam earned his first tour-level win in 1991 at the age of 23; his latest win (at Bass Pro Tour Stage Four at Lake Chickamauga in Tennessee) came four months shy of his 54th birthday.

"Today is both a sad day and a time for celebration in our sport," said MLF President and CEO Boyd Duckett, a longtime competitor of VanDam's. "Having known Kevin through my entire

pro career, he is not only the best angler of all time, but also one of the best human beings that I know. He is the most liked and caring individual that I have ever met. There are thousands of stories of him loaning a bait to another angler or competitor, or talking fishing and taking pictures with fans in the parking lot after a full day of competition. It truly speaks volumes about him as a human being."

Hall wrote and recorded one of his biggest #1 hits... "Old Dogs and Children and Watermelon Wine". It's a true story of while touring he met a waiter in a bar that 11 months earlier turned 65 years old. Uninvited the man sat down to share some thoughts on life. I know...after fishing 20-30 tournaments a year for 7 years and twice representing Kansas on their Federation Team this seems a bit of "overkill" right? Well...what can I say...I'm a complicated man...!

But I realized then...as I do now... it's time to re-think my priorities!

This great magazine and website are filled with incredible people that unselfishly contribute to it for no other reason than to help each of us be more successful every time we are on the water... and this issue is no exception. How to Fillet A Fish from takemefishing.org

Learning how to fillet a fish is easier that you think. In this section, we will give you basic information and simple steps on how to clean and fillet a fish properly.

You've had a great day of fishing. You've even landed a few for a filling meal. First and foremost, it is vital to keep your catch properly stored and chilled until you're ready to prepare the fish for cooking. While you may prefer to cook your smaller species whole, larger fish, such as largemouth bass, northern pike, salmon, and walleye, are usually filleted. Learning how to fillet a fish means getting the meat of the fish without the bones. Instructions on how to fillet a fish step by step are listed below, but there are a few steps that need to come first.

HOW TO CLEAN A FISH: BASICS

As noted above, some fish varieties are small enough to eat whole. While there are several methods available for cooking whole fish, learning how to clean a fish is necessary before putting the fish on heat.

Scaling: Scaling is the act of removing scales from the skin of the fish. There are specifically designed scalers to manage the task which are available where fishing equipment is sold. Or, if no scaler is available, the back of a knife can be used. Use caution. Children should never be left unsupervised when handling sharp objects. To scale the fish, place your scaler near the tail and rub it along the skin toward the head. Repeat as needed until all scales have been removed then rinse the fish off to ensure that the skin is free of scales.

For added safety, wear metal-mesh "fish-cleaning" gloves to protect your hands from sharp scales.

Gutting: Learning how to gut a fish is actually relatively easy. Simply place the tip of the knife into the fish's anus next to the tail and cut forward toward the head. The knife will naturally stop at the fish's head. Spread the abdominal cavity open and remove the innards with your hands. Rinse the cavity clean. If you don't intend to cook the fish with its head, now is when you can remove it by slicing through the fish just in front of the pectoral fins.

Now that the fish is clean, you're ready to cook the smaller pieces. To learn how to fillet fish the easy way, follow the filleting fish instructions below.

HOW TO FILLET A FISH: STEPS

A filleted fish has its skin and bones removed before cooking. Scaling isn't necessary. Fillet knives have a long, thin, blade that's very sharp and specifically designed for filleting fish. Follow the instructions below to learn how to fillet a fish set by

An adult should always supervise young anglers as they learn to fillet. A fillet knife is dangerous and must be handled safely. If you have any slime on your hands or the knife handle, wash it off to prevent slipping.



Always keep your hands behind the blade.

- To fillet a fish, lay it on its side on a flat surface. Unlike the cut described for preparing whole fish, filleting fish requires you to cut the fish behind its gills and pectoral fin, but only to the rib cage. Neither scaling nor removing the head is necessary.
- If not removing the head, turn the blade toward the tail and cut along the top of the ribs using the fish's backbone to guide you. Turn the fish over and repeat steps 2 and 3.
 - Next, insert the knife blade close to the rib bones and slice the entire rib section of each fillet away. Then, with the skin side down, insert the knife blade about a 1/2-inch from the tail. Gripping this tail part firmly, put the blade between the skin and the meat at an angle. Using a little pressure and a sawing motion, cut against not through - the skin. The fillet will be removed from the skin.
- Wash each fillet in cold water. Pat dry with a clean cloth or paper towel. The fillets are ready to cook or freeze.



The lake's great fishing allows the Dills to succeed in their various endeavors. "We just have an abundance of quality bass in the 3- to 5-pound range at the lake," Jim says, "and the crappie fishing is second to none."

Jim's favorite lure for catching Lake of the Ozarks bass is a jig. "There is so much you can do with a jig whether it is fishing out deep on ledges or flipping docks," he says. "I really enjoy making good accurate smooth flips underneath docks and back in hard-to-reach places where the better fish seem to hang out."

Denise opts for a shaky head tipped with a soft plastic bait for tricking the lake's bass. "It is a bait that once the water temperature gets warm you can use it all the way up until fall," she says. "It is just a real versatile bait that you can fish for many months. You can also change up your shaky head trailers and have some flexibility with that."

Newcomers to the lake should heed the following advice from the Dills to catch Lake of the Ozarks bass. "Put on a 1/4ounce Crock-O-Gator shaky head with a little worm and throw it wherever you want to throw it and you are going to catch them," Jim says. "Keep it simple and just go out and catch fish."



How to Wire Batteries in Series and Parallel [24 & 36 Volt Trolling Motors]


The why, when and how to wire trolling motor batteries in series or parallel

Trolling motors from Minn Kota feature robust 24 and 36 volt systems with enough power to cut through thick vegetation and hold you on spots in heavy wind. For those who do not install trolling motors for a living, one challenge to rigging a new trolling motor can be a complete understanding of how batteries can and should be wired together to create enough power to manage these systems.

We're going to walk you through everything you need to know when it comes to wiring trolling motor batteries.

How to Wire a 12 volt **Trolling Motor**

The first trolling motor that most anglers are introduced to are 12 volt models in one capacity or another. These relatively simple set-ups make rigging a snap and can be as straightforward as connecting a red (+ Positive) and black (- Negative) wire lead to the respective positive and negative 12 volt marine battery terminal/post or even a Minn Kota Power Center.



If you connect directly to the battery and not through a Minn Kota Power Center, be sure to use the proper fuse protection or marine breaker whenever wiring any trolling motor or marine electronics.

How to Get 24 or 36 Volts from **12 Volt Marine Batteries**

When stepping up to a more powerful 24 or 36 volt trolling motor, there are a few more steps involved to supply clean, safe

power. Rigging batteries in what's known as a series adds together the

voltage of the battery. So a 24 volt system will require 2 common 12 volt marine batteries in series ($12v \times 2 = 24v$) and a 36 volt system will require $3 (12v \times 3 = 36v)$.

Before we explain wiring trolling motor batteries in a series, it is important to first understand two concepts, amperage and voltage, and how they're affected by wiring batteries in a series or parallel.

Marine Battery Voltage and Amperage [Explained]

Voltage and Amperage are two electrical measures. Voltage is a measure of force or pressure of electricity, while Amperage is a measure of volume of the current flowing from a power source.

Voltage = the force of electricity **Amperage** = Amount of current flow

To draw a comparison, we can think of electricity as a waterfall where voltage is represented by the height of the waterfall, and amperage is the amount of water flowing from the top. The higher the cliff (Voltage) the more energy the water will possess when it reaches the bottom.

Likewise, the amount of water (Amperage) is important because a small amount of water over a great height will still not be as impressive as thousands of gallons from a modest height.

Amp-hours, then, would be the total amount of water in the lake at the top. When the lake has dried up, our battery has died and will need to be recharged.





Wiring Batteries in Series vs Parallel [Basics]

Now that we have a basic understanding of amps and volts, we can better imagine how to utilize the power of multiple 12 volt batteries. Wiring in series sums the voltages of the batteries used while keeping capacity, or the amp-hour rating constant. Conversely, wiring in parallel sums capacity (amp-hours) while maintaining our single-battery voltage.

If we start with two identical 12 Volt, 100 amp hour batteries, we can do some simple math to see where our electrical system ends up:

Series: 12 volts x 2 = 24 volts,

100 amp-hours

Parallel: 100 amp-hours x 2 =

200 amp-hours, 12 volts

When to Wire in a Series vs. Parallel



To bring this back to a real-world fishing example, let's imagine two scenarios. In the first scenario, an angler loves their 12 volt trolling motor and it works perfectly for them. They do not need extra thrust or speed, but over the course of the day they find that their battery drain before they're done fishing.

This angler would benefit from adding a 12 volt battery to their boat, wired in parallel so that they can effectively double their run time (amp-hours).

In our second scenario, the same angler finds that even on its highest setting, their 12 volt trolling motor is not powerful enough to hold them in the heavy wind and current.



This angler would benefit from using a 24 volt trolling motor and adding another 12 volt battery, but wiring it in series, ultimately resulting in more power.


Important: Only create a 24 or 36 volt system for trolling motors rated for that voltage.

How to Wire Trolling Motor Batteries in Series

Before wiring your trolling motor batteries in series it's important to note that it is recommended that all batteries included in a series should be the same type (all lead-acid, all AGM or all Lithium), size (volts/amps), and age.

24 Volt Trolling Motor Wiring Diagram (2 batteries)


Following this diagram by wiring two 12 volt batteries in series will result in a 24 volt system.



- 1. Two 12 volt deep cycle batteries are required
- 2. Make sure that the trolling motor is disconnected
- 3. Wire in series only as directed in wiring diagram, to provide 24 volts
 - a. Connect a connector/jumper wire to the positive (+) terminal of battery 1 and to the negative (-) terminal of battery 2
 - b. Connect positive (+) red lead (from trolling motor) to positive (+) terminal on battery 2
 - c. Connect negative (-) black lead (from trolling motor) to negative (-) terminal of battery 1

36 Volt Trolling Motor Wiring Diagram (3 batteries)

Following this diagram by wiring three 12 volt batteries in series will result in a 36 volt system.



- 1. Three 12 volt deep cycle batteries are required
- 2. Make sure that the trolling motor is disconnected
- 3. Wire in series only as directed in wiring diagram, to provide 36 volts
 - a. Connect a connector/jumper wire to the positive (+) terminal of battery 1 and to the negative (-) terminal of battery 2
 - b. Connect a connector/jumper wire to the positive (+) terminal of battery 2 and to the negative (-) terminal of battery 3
 - c. Connect positive (+) red lead (from trolling motor) to positive (+) terminal on battery 3
 - d. Connect negative (-) black lead (from trolling motor) to negative (-) terminal of battery 1


What size connection/jumper wire should you use when connecting trolling motor batteries in series - It's best to use a wire gauge at least one size larger than your trolling motor power leads. For example, if your trolling motor leads are 10AWG, it would be best to use 8AWG or 9AWG wire for your jumper wires.

How to Wire Trolling Motor Batteries in Parallel

Before wiring your marine batteries in parallel it's important to note that it is recommended that all batteries included in parallel should be the same type (all lead-acid, all AGM or all Lithium), size (volts/amps), and age.

12 Volt Parallel Wiring Diagram (2 Batteries)

Following this diagram by wiring two 12 volt batteries in parallel will result in doubling the amp-hours available to your trolling motor or accessory.



- 1. Two 12 volt deep cycle batteries are required
- 2. Make sure that the trolling motor or accessories are disconnected
- 3. Wire in parallel only as directed in wiring diagram, to provide 12 volt system with increased amp hour capacity.
 - a. Connect a connector cable to the positive (+) terminal of battery 1 and to the positive (+) terminal of battery 2
 - b. Connect a connector cable to the negative (-) terminal of battery 1 and to the negative (-) terminal of battery 2.

- c. Connect positive (+) red lead (from motor) to positive (+) terminal on battery 2
- d. Connect negative (-) black lead (from motor) to negative (-) terminal of battery 1

Best Way to Charge Your Trolling Motor Batteries

Now that you've learned everything you need to know to identify your battery system and how to configure it, let's quickly touch on how you can charge them with ease.

Whether wiring in parallel or series, batteries can still be charged individually by a 12-volt, multi-bank charger without disconnecting any leads, making sure to charge and discharge all batteries at the same rate to extend battery life.

Hopefully this quick guide has helped to remove the mystery around wiring multiple trolling motor batteries in series to create either a 24 or 36 volt system, as well as wiring multiple batteries in parallel.

Important Information & Tips

- Series: Increases voltage, but amphours stay the same = More Power
- Parallel: Increases Amp-Hours, but Voltage stays the same = More Run
- Important: Only create a 24 or 36 volt system (series) for trolling motors that are rated for that voltage
- Before wiring your trolling motor batteries in series or parallel, it's recommended that all batteries included should be the same type (i.e. all lead-acid, all AGM or all Lithium), size (volts/amps), and age
- Always use the proper fuse protection or marine breaker on your positive lead to your trolling motor or accessory to protect it
- Utilize a Minn Kota On-Board Charger to make charging simple and effective based on your battery type

f you're just getting into the forward-facing sonar game now, you've arrived fashionably late to the party. Still, there's no time like the present, and the book on forward-facing sonar hasn't been written yet. Fishing with Garmin LiveScope, Cody Huff has been at the cutting edge since his days at Bethel University, and though each forward-facing product is a bit different, a lot of the same principles apply between them. So, if you're new to forward-facing sonar, or just looking to up your game a bit, consider taking a note or two from Huff.

1. Equipment Considerations

It's very easy to buy a pre-boxed setup from almost any electronics manufacturer these days to get you rolling with forwardfacing sonar. Huff uses LiveScope, and he's got a few general equipment preferences that are interesting to consider.

One of the biggest things Huff does is run a big screen, opting for a 16-inch graph on his 2021 tournament rig.

"If you've used LiveScope before, you know when the fish are going straight away from you or straight at you, you can barely see them," he says. "When that stuff

happens and I'm running the 16-inch, I can see that stuff, the stuff you could never see before. People say I'm crazy for running one that big, but I'm a big fan, it makes a difference."

Troy Morrow runs a 10-inch unit for his LiveScope, and it's not uncommon advice to go with a 10-inch size for picture and affordability. Still, Huff is a believer in bigger being better.

"I use it so much, I can justify having it," he says of his 16-inch unit, which is an upgrade from the 12-inch graph he used to run. "The bigger, the better for me, if I




could fit a TV screen up there I would. I had a buddy that bought a 10-inch, and he went fishing with me, and he sold his the next day and bought a 12-inch. You can do all the same stuff on a 9-inch or a 10-inch, it just makes it easier on you."

If a really big graph isn't in the cards, one thing Huff would recommend regardless is mounting your unit on something that is a bit higher up than standard. Every inch helps when it comes to staring at the screen, and when you're catching a lot of fish on forward-facing sonar, you'll end up staring at it more than you've ever looked at a bow graph before.

2. Experiment with Your **Transducer Angle**

As with any sonar, how your transducer is mounted means a lot. It's why some like to mount their forward-facing transducer

on a separate pole, and why others like Spencer Shuffield turn to a RAM Mount or a similar style to mount their transducer on the shaft of the trolling motor. Huff likes to mount his on the shaft, but he doesn't follow the instructions in the manual.

"The way I have my transducer set up, I keep it like a click higher, maybe two clicks, so I can see my bait splash the water," he says. "If I see a fish at 80 feet, and I cast past it to 90 feet, I can see my bait splash. By seeing your bait splash, it's a lot easier to track it going down. You can see the little dot sinking past them and be ready."

3. Keep Your Foot on the Pedal

One of the most common goals with forward-facing sonar is watching your bait in the water column. Along the way, you can learn a lot about your retrieve and the reactions of the bass along the way. But it's not necessarily super easy to do until you get used to it.

"Everybody wants to find their target, a brushpile, or a rock, or whatever they're throwing at, and they'll point their trolling motor at it, take their foot off it, and cast and just expect the boat not to float," Huff says. "They expect nothing to move, and they think it's the equipment's fault that it didn't stay in front of it.

"If you're really trying to use LiveScope to its full potential, you've got to always have your foot on the pedal where you're able to move it back and forth and adjust with the wind and the boat movement," Huff explains. "If you're fishing schools of baitfish, you need to always have it moving and be following the bait. Those variables are moving all the time, and you've got to keep moving with them."

Fear not, if you're having trouble keeping your bait or target in view, Huff has a quick fix to shorten the learning curve.

"It's a lot easier if you pay attention to the wind before you pull up on a target," he says. "Make sure you pull up downwind of it, if you point your nose into the wind, it's a lot easier to stay on target. Then you're not drifting sideways, and you don't have to account for as much movement."

4. Reap the Benefits

Forward-facing sonar helps in a lot of ways, but it can help you unlock truly new ways of fishing, which is one of the things Huff likes best about it.

"You always hear stories about guys catching them out over deep water on topwater and stuff like that," Huff says. "You just hear it, you've never seen it, and you don't know where to start. Since I've got LiveScope, I can learn in areas that there are little spots where they'll just stay up by the top, where you can actually fish what looks like the middle of the lake, but because of a contour line that comes up a little higher than the rest, they'll still hang around that."

It's something that he thinks would be nearly impossible to find on traditional sonar, because high, roaming offshore fish don't tend to stay put.

"You would have to get really, really lucky," he says. "You'd have to get crazy lucky to somehow idle right over them, because they move so, so much. With LiveScope, you can see them and stay with them."

High, offshore fish have gone a long way for Huff in the past. In the fall of 2020, he locked down the win in the Toyota Series event on Table Rock with smallmouths he plucked from 10 feet down in over 100 feet of water.




